Back in August you may have noticed our Public Works crew repainting road crossing markings which is a sure sign it's back-to-school time. Please show extra caution as the children are walking to school. Be on the lookout for school zone signals and always obey speed limits in our Village. Stop for each school bus loading and unloading and be sure to slow down and obey all traffic laws especially when entering a school zone. Remember to stay off your cell phone as well, it is illegal to use them AT ALL in school zones.

Not only are the seasons changing but we are living in a rapidly evolving world, one which impacts us on a national as well as a local level. This includes how we recycle. You may be seeing stories of China, a chief importer of recycled goods, refusing to accept or becoming more stringent on the quality of recyclables they will accept. These stories are putting a spotlight on a topic I would like to address: good recycling habits. So who's the recycler in your home? We have become overly ambitious with our habits and it's hurting what otherwise would be a tremendous opportunity. So what do good recycling habits look like? A good rule of thumb is if it is soiled or wet, it probably cannot be recycled. One soiled item can contaminate a whole load of otherwise clean recycled goods making the whole load become regular trash. "Soiled and wet" includes greasy pizza boxes, oily takeout containers and used napkins and tissues. If you are going to recycle a plastic bottle, jug or metal can, make sure it is clean and dry before putting it in your bin. DO NOT BAG your recyclables. Bagging them disrupts the sorting process, so keep them loose. Our refuse and recycling contractor, Republic Services, has a great website for you to explore and learn these quick and easy lessons. 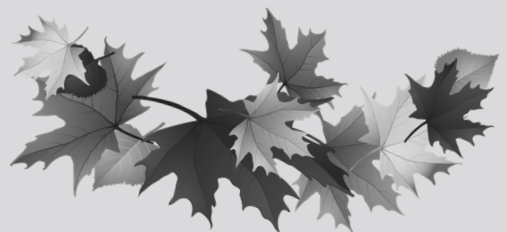

Other yard waste (grass clippings, sticks, weeds, etc.) must have a sticker. Yard waste stickers are \$2.55 each. Stickers are sold at Village Hall, Clarendon Hills Hardware and Jewel on 55th.

Electrical Aggregation– 100% Green Energy

Following a 2013 referendum, residents allowed the Village of Clarendon Hills to negotiate the purchase price of combined electrical supply on behalf of residents and small businesses enrolled in the Aggregation Program (Program). The Village can leverage better pricing by lumping several purchasers together opposed to an individual going to the market on their own. Since 2013, the Village has held a competitive bidding process on behalf of participants to find the best electric prices. The lowest competitive bidder is awarded a contract for a 12 month period. The 2017-2018 supplier's contract expires at the beginning of October, 2018.

In June of 2018, the Village again held a competitive bid for the Program. This year, bidders offered rates very similar to ComEd's rate. It was estimated the lowest competitive bidder would save Program participants around \$5 to \$10.00 over the course of the 12-month contract. Due to the eclipsing of alternate suppliers and ComEd's rates, the Village Board authorized a new program with MC Squared (MC2). The new Program will charge participants the same rate as ComEd but all energy consumption will be offset by the purchasing Renewable Energy Credits (RECs). By purchasing the RECs to offset consumption, the Village's new program is 100% green energy. You do not need to do anything to participate in the Village's program if you are already enrolled. If you are currently enrolled in the Program and **wish to opt out, you have 21 days after August 14, 2018 to do so**. You can opt out by calling 1-855-745-9989, Monday-Friday between 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM.

As a reminder, all of the wires and transmission are still handled by ComEd. To report an electrical outage, or for questions pertaining to your ComEd bill, call ComEd at 800-334-7661.

Resident's can choose other third party suppliers. If doing so, the Village recommends you read all of the fine print, especially for introductory rates that increase shortly thereafter. Also, look for potential opt-out penalties in these agreements.

If you require additional assistance, call NIMEC at 800-727-3820 to leave your question and callback number. You will be contacted within 24 hours regarding the issue.

PROPER RECYCLING

Paper: **YES** to mixed paper; advertisements, direct mail, paper, gift wrap, envelopes, magazines, newspapers and catalogs. **NO** to disposable diapers or rags and **NO** to soiled items like napkins and tissues.

Cartons: **YES** to cardboard and boxboard, soda and beer cases, milk and juice containers. **NO** to cardboard soiled with grease or food (i.e. pizza boxes) and **NO** to polystyrene foam materials coded #6 (i.e. egg cartons).

Glass: **YES** to clear, green and brown glass bottles and jars. **NO** to mirrors, window glass, Pyrex glass, dinnerware or any ceramics. **NO** to compact fluorescent or other light bulbs.

Metal: **YES** to aluminum cans, foil, tin and steel cans including empty aerosol cans. **NO** to needles, syringes, pots or pans and **NO** to gas cans or other items containing hazardous chemicals.

Plastic: **YES** to plastic bottles and containers coded #1 thru #5 and #7, but not #6. Six and twelve pack rings are also accepted. **NO** to plastic bags, film, Styrofoam or packing peanuts. **NO** also to plastic take-out containers, cups, plates or utensils; **NO** plastic toys, insecticide and hazardous chemical containers.

Unacceptable Items: Tires, engine parts, auto body or interior parts; Motor oil, paint, car batteries, antifreeze or liquids of any kind; Garbage and food waste; Wood pallets or construction lumber; Yard waste such as grass clippings, leaves and tree or plant branches; electronic items, printer or toner cartridges.

Back to School Safety

Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians

According to research by the National Safety Council, most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related incidents are 4 to 7 years old, and they're walking. They are hit by the bus, or by a motorist illegally passing a stopped bus. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe:

Keep a look out for Pedestrians

Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a stop sign or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of moving traffic.

- In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian, even if you have the right of way
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way

Sharing the Road with School Buses

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

- Never pass a bus from behind – or from either direction if you're on an undivided road – if it is stopped to load or unload children
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus
- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks
- Watch for bikes coming from driveways or behind parked cars
- Check side mirrors before opening your door



Please note that in the state of Illinois all cell phone use is prohibited while driving in a school zone.

By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.
